What is the magic that allows an organization to thrive? I often get this question when I talk with people about the mission at The Filling Station. Miracles are often misinterpreted as "magic". 2021 has been a year of miracles. When preparation meets opportunity, the possibilities are endless.

November was definitely the month for Thanksgiving. The Filling Station participated in the Jones County Heritage Festival. We visited with over 75 people who visited our tent wanting to know more about how to partner, volunteer and how to connect to learn more about our programming. We continue to be grateful for the opportunity to serve on the Neuse River Bridge Run Committee. This partnership highlights the importance of "bridging communities" and The Filling Station can continue to thrive being one of the 7 nonprofits to receive funding from this event April 8-9, 2022.

Our Board of Directors held the last board meeting of the year with an exciting agenda to adopt the 2022 budget, adopt our 3 year Strategic Plan and approve expenditures that will continue to enhance the campus.

A BIG thank you to Cathy Smith who has been working closely with our Board of Directors and myself to identify clear goals and priorities to support the mission of The Filling Station.

Lastly, our organization was one of 40 nonprofits to participate in the Giving Tuesday Event at Union Point in New Bern. We received over \$2500 in donations and had the opportunity to share the mission with our neighboring county.

December kicked off with The Filling Station being the host site for Christmas on

There is always room at the table as we work to assist meeting the unmet needs in the areas of Nutrition, Education and Connection to the residents of Jones County.

Miracles comes from a mindset of "service above self." Our most valuable asset is our volunteer family. They bring heart, joy and love as we connect and serve. It seems as if the energy is endless. And, then I am reminded of our logo which features a flame. When we find a need and fill it for our neighbors, we tap into the fuel that keeps the flame going.

In 2022, we will be rolling out new programming to include:

2022 will be another year of MIRACLE MAK-ING. Thank you for sharing the story of The Filling Station. You make a difference.



Donor Spotlight: 10-year old Lindsey Compton of Raleigh

Lindsey Compton's parents Hannah and Jim took a trip to Israel and happened to strike up a conversation with Carol and Bob Mattocks. As you know Carol is one of the founders of the Filling Station. They got into a discussion about Jones County. Later Lindsey and her family were discussing the devastation in Jones County caused by Hurricane Florence in 2018. Lindsey wanted to help and asked her mom what she could do. They contacted the Filling Station and arranged for Lindsey to volunteer there. "We delivered food to those in need and helped stock canned and other foods in the pantry," said Lindsey. And that was only the beginning. The Comptons drive from Raleigh to Jones County as often as they can to continue to volunteer at the Filling Station. We need more young folk like Lindsey who are willing to give of themselves to a larger cause. The Filling Station is so grateful for volunteers like the Comptons without whom they could not fulfill their mission.

Board Member Spotlight: Dr. Norma Sermon-Boyd



Dr. Norma Sermon-Boyd, a native of Kannapolis, North Carolina, graduated from George Washington Carver High School. After receiving a Bachelor of Science Degree from Shaw University in Mathematics and Science. She began her distinguished career as an educator in New Bern, North Carolina. She subsequently obtained a Master Degree from East Carolina University and the Doctorate of School Administration from Nova University. She has used each of her degrees in the area earned to continuously improve the quality of life for children and adults, not only in North Carolina and Virginia but also Japan,

where she taught in the graduate program for the University of Maryland. Her extensive travels abroad and throughout the United States have enabled her to bring a global perspective to education and her community. She holds keys to six USA cities.

Dr. Sermon-Boyd taught mathematics and science in Spotsylvania County, Virginia where she was the first African American to

teach at Spotsylvania High School before integration. Returning to North Carolina, Sermon-Boyd moved to Jones County where she taught mathematics and science, served as assistant principal, high school guidance counselor, director of secondary education, director of staff development and grants, and director of exceptional children. She later became the first principal of the new Pollocksville Elementary School.

In 1993, Dr. Norma Sermon-Boyd became the first African American and first female Superintendent in Jones County and at the time was the only African American female Superintendent in North Carolina. As superintendent, she led the Jones County Schools through the North Carolina Accountability Program leaving the Elementary Schools ranking in the top sixteen percent of Elementary Schools in North Carolina. She left the school system prepared to meet the challenges of President Bush's No Child Left Behind Act. Technology, systemic staff development and facilities were also major accomplishments during her superintendence. She serves as Vice Chair of the Jones County Committee of 100, member of the East Carolina Workforce Development Board, Twin Rivers Opportunity Housing Board and Jones County Interagency Committee.

Dr. Sermon Boyd serves as Executive Director of the Jones County Partnership for Children (SMART START) where she has worked to ensure that all centers are four and five star sites and most recently worked to ensure that all of the employees of these sites had health care as a result of the Affordable Care Act-Obama Care. The Partnership serves as the contractor for 71 students enrolled for the Jones County NC Pre-K

program and has enrolled 160 students in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library in the last months. She is a member of Saint Phillip Missionary Baptist Church in Pollocksville, NC.

She is the proud mother of Michelle Sermon-Davis (Rodney) and Richard Lamonte' Sermon (Michelle C) and four grandchildren Laila, Rayna, Clayton and Moriah.

Dr. Sermon-Boyd was a founding member of the Filling Station and continues to serve as its Treasurer. She is proud to be a part of the Filling Station because it is an organization that strives to meet the educational, economic and nutritional needs of all citizens and families of Jones County. The mission is lived every day.



Volunteer Spotlight: Judy Hills

Judy Hills is the President of the Friends of the North Carolina Public Libraries, Vice-President of the Friends of the New Bern-Craven County Public Library, and Secretary of the North Carolina Coastal and Piedmont Chapter of the Antique and Classic Boating Society. She is responsible for two monthly newsletters and manages two websites. She has an MBA degree.

Now retired, her first career was as a registered nurse; her second career was in commercial real estate; and her third career was in quasi-governmental organizations. At the end of her career, she was the Executive Director of a nine-county planning organization, the Eastern Carolina Council of Governments based in New Bern.

During the course of her life, Judy taught college level courses in non-profit management and business. She helped secure many millions of dollars in Federal, state, and other grants. She provided and continues to provide grant opportunity information to the nonprofit community.



Teaching Kitchen Project

In April 2021, the Facilities committee began meeting on the plans for a teaching kitchen to serve the residents of Jones County. With the volunteer support and leadership of Ed Jekel, Facilities Manager, and oversight from John Taylor, Facilities Chair along with Mary Ann LeRay, Executive Director, and the funding sources, great progress is happening. Plans were drawn and submitted based on research done with N.C. Cooperative Extension Jones County and Wayne County.

In order to create the space necessary, walls needed to be removed, wiring rerouted, heating and air ducts redirected. We will be able to restore the previous check-in counter and flooring. All the cabinets and old appliances have been removed to prepare for the new ones coming. The change over from propane to natural gas has been completed which will be a huge savings over the years.

As with any project, there are challenges with scheduling and delivery of items for the plan. We are hopeful the teaching kitchen will be ready by June 2022.
